PK's Little Epiphanies


Hello Epiphany Friends,

I get weird and forgotten words in my facebook feed. Recently the word "Coddiwomple" turned up and, lo and behold, it happens to be exactly what we are doing as a congregation. We know we aren't closing, we know we aren't staying in our current building and we are moving ahead with purpose, but without a destination. We have engaged Paul Nagel with Gundaker Commercial to list the building for sale and an architect from the neighborhood to do the measurements and floor plans. The Council has been in conversation around both short and

long term solutions from cohabitating with another congregation to renting or buying our own space. We are in full coddiwomple. Even though it could take up to a year to sell the building we will need to begin discussion of what we want to take with us and what we can release (sell, donate, dispose of, leave behind, etc.)

My family motto is "Adventures in Living" and it seem to me that we who are Epiphany might think of this particular coddiwomple as "Adventures in Being Church" and it might even be fun along the way... or at least non-fatal as long as we stick together and get to where we are going without leaving anyone behind.

EYES WIDE OPEN



When I was a kid, I was drawn to scary films, but I had no tolerance for gore. I watched a lot of films through my fingers or actually closing my eyes when the scary parts came, and then having to ask what happened. As I have matured, I still don't like the gore or the really painful parts. But I have come to understand that if I want to see with God's eyes, I have to be willing to see the pain, to look at this world with my eyes wide open.

Becoming Kin: An Indigenous Call to Unforgetting the Past and Reimagining Our Future is a book that invites us to see our history with our eyes wide open, and to let what we learn from that help us envision the future God wants for all our kin in creation. The author, Patty Krawec, is a Canadian Anishinaabe Presbyterian Christian woman who invites North Americans in particular to hear the history of this continent from the perspective of those who were here long before 1492. She reminds us that this continent was not discovered, but was invaded and colonized, and that the invaders and colonizers did so not only for kings and queens but for the church as well. She reiterates that reality that we cannot help heal in the present if we cannot tell the truth about the past. And she does all of this with candor and compassion, with sadness and with hope.

Epiphany Adult Ed is currently reading and discussing this book. I am reading it with a book group. It is kindling a lot of interest, I think because of its compassion and hope while telling hard truths. I encourage you to read Becoming Kin, to let your eyes be opened more widely. I pray it blesses you and your work in this world.











SOUND BATH JOURNEY

The first thing I see is the dim amber light of the sanctuary guiding me to move slowly as I make my way down the sides. The center aisle is filled with gongs. Finding a comfy place to lay on the floor or along a pew with a comfy blanket and pillow, the guides introduce themselves and let us know how

this Sound Journey is like a massage from the inside out. The vibrational healing is ours to just lay relax and feel. I close my eyes and start to hear the quiet bells, and bowls, building up to deep tone didgeridoo and gongs. I hear the whispers of the ancestors ride the tones in this sacred space and let the vibrations move through me as we journey together bathing in the sound. I relax completely. The acoustics of this space allows the sound to washes over, coming from above, below and all around me. After building up like a concert and then back down again, we are guided gently to the end. I move slowly and clearly taking time for a bit of writing about where I went and what clarity I felt in this meditation.


