# **WHAT'S NEXT?**

At our last congregational meeting, one of the many possibilities for our future that was discussed was that of merger. Carondelet UCC in south city came up as a potential partner if we considered merger. After some conversation with their pastor, Brad Urban, it became clear that both congregations are open to initial conversations about merger and that the congregations do not know each other very well. The two pastors and the two councils have scheduled to meet September 5th for a getting acquainted conversation. The conversation will begin around the following questions:

- 1. A brief history of your church
- 2. What missions/ministries currently excite you?
- 3. Current challenges for your church?
- 4. How does your congregation practice justice and inclusion as a congregation?
- 5. What's next for your church?

The experts tell us that successful mergers happen when churches merge around mission. The intention of this conversation is to get to know each other better, for each church to be stretched in our respective discernment processes, and to learn more about each other's missional visions. We will have feedback for you at the next congregational meeting.









### CHRISTIAN EDUCATION


#### UME WRAP UP

It was such a wonderful gift to host four groups at Epiphany this Summer for Urban Mission Experience STL! There were youth groups from Columbia UCC, Columbia, MO, Pilgrim UCC, Grafton, WI, Edmond FCC, Edmond, OK and First Congregational UCC, Downer's Grove, IL. We had 47 people participate (ages 11-80), and the UME program raised \$7,050 this year.

This year our participants worked at the English Cave Garden, Seed STL, LifeWise STL, Lydia's House, and St. Louis Area Foodbank. Activities included sorting food donations, gardening, yard work, cleaning, and apartment setup. They volunteered at Epiphany cleaning and organizing the two sanctuary balconies, sacristy, upstairs hall closet, and basement storage room. Additionally, I took each group on a Benton Park neighborhood walking tour while we picked up trash in the alleys.

I'm so grateful to our partner organizations, the St. Louis Association, Joint Neighborhood Ministries, and Carondelet YMCA for their support. And a special thank you goes out to Norma Keller, Bob Keller, and Dorothy Gannon for their help with the UME dinners.

### END OF AN ERA

About 30 years ago, a young, quiet relatively new college graduate named Pete Ruthenburg arrived at Epiphany. With his jazz hands and unbelievable patience and flexibility, he joined the family as our pianist/organist. In the years since, we got to know and love his then new wife Vicki, to baptize his twins Jackson and Hannah, and to watch the kids grow up. We celebrated his interesting gigs live and on-line, grieved losses, and supported his new career in music education. And through all that he blessed us Sunday after Sunday.



We are so grateful. We have been together through 3 pastors and at least three interims, 3 pianos and keyboards, hundreds of worship services and choir rehearsals, lots of potlucks and congregational meetings, and one pandemic. As our musician, he was patient with a choir that had no director and had a coordinator who could not conduct. He faithfully undergirded our singing and improvised through preludes and offertories and communions and Prayers As We Go and postludes. He made concert videos for us that comforted and encouraged during the long periods of the pandemic when we could not be together. He allowed the Holy Spirit to work through him week after week, year after year, to be a blessing to this piece of the Body of Christ.

Preachers can all tell a story about the time when someone thanked them after worship for saying XYZ during the sermon because it was exactly what they needed to hear, when the preacher knows for certain they never said XYZ. But we trust that the Spirit was at work bringing what someone needed to hear. We know there were some Sundays when work the night before had gone pretty late and he was, shall we say, less prepared than other Sundays. We want to be sure he knows that a Sunday has not gone by when some among us have not been blessed by his riff on a hymn that was exactly what we needed to hear. For more than 30 years, Pete has blessed our minds, our hearts, our souls, with his talent and his passion and his willingness to be used by the Spirit among us.

It has long been one of Epiphany's missions to receive the gifts God sned us in each person who comes through our doors and stays a while, and then to bless their journey when it is time for folks to leave. Pete ended his ministry among us this July and is now sharing his gifts with Bethlehem Lutheran Church in north city. We are grieving the loss of his presence and his gifts among us even as we give thanks for all that God is doing and will do in and through him in his new ministry. Thank you seems inadequate. But we give thanks anyway. Thank you, Pete. And thank you, God.
